All performances, fully staged, will be accompanied by the acclaimed St. Luke's Chamber Ensemble and sung in English. The Ensemble will be assisted by the All City High School Chorus directed by John Motley. The free performances will be given in concert halls throughout the city, recreating the excitement and ambience of an evening at the Opera.

To assist teachers, study guides will be provided in advance of the performances. These guides will include background information and historical notes suitable for lesson plans.


